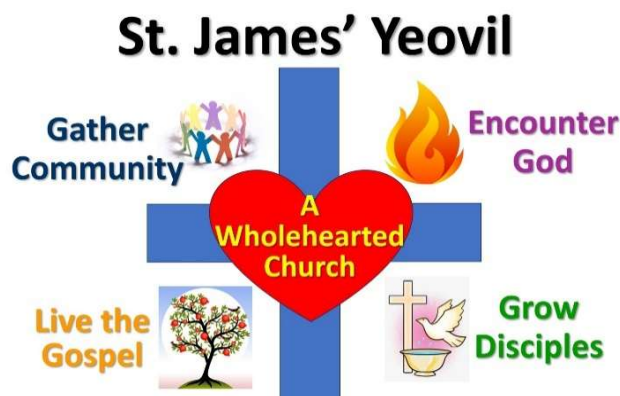

1. Annual Report

Administrative Information, Structure, Governance and Management

St James' and St Peter's churches are situated in the Preston Plucknett district of Yeovil. The registered name is: The Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of St James The Great Yeovil.

They are part of the Diocese of Bath and Wells within the Church of England. The parish office address is St James' Church Preston Plucknett, Preston Road, Yeovil, Somerset, BA20 2EZ.

These financial accounts are the consolidated accounts for St James, St Peter's and St Peter's Community Centre. A summary of the separate accounts can be found under notes 16, 17 and 18.

Owing to the overall income being over £100,000 the PCC is registered with the Charity Commission as a charity in its own right. The Charity Registration number is 1158827.

The PCC is aware of the risks to which it may be exposed. Financial risk is managed through the PCC's financial procedures. Insurance continues to be with EIG. Statutory and legal requirements, in particular health & safety and safeguarding are closely monitored by nominated individuals on the PCC and consents, processes, procedures, and records are sought or maintained, as necessary. The PCC is aware of the introduction of the General Data Protection Regulations in May 2018 and maintains arrangements to ensure compliance.

The members of the PCC are appointed according to arrangements set out in the Church Representation Rules. Members are recruited from those on the Church Electoral Rolls and appointed for a three-year term. The appointment is made either by approval at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting or by election if necessary. New members are introduced to PCC procedures and workings.

Aims and Purposes.

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent the Reverend David Keen, and the Associate Vicar Reverend Sarah Sanderson in promoting the whole mission of the Church of England, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical.

The PCC is also specifically responsible for the maintenance of the Church Buildings, comprising.

St James main church, entrance vestibule and office and church room, and St Peters main church and St Peters Community Centre.

Membership:

The PCC maintains separate electoral rolls for each of our Churches.

St James

As at April 2025 there were 102 parishioners (2024 – 92) on the St James' Electoral Roll.

Church membership, our worshipping community, those who regularly worship and are counted as part of the annual parish return, is 130 Adults (2024 – 140) and 12 children (2024 – 23).

The average weekly attendance, taken during October 2025 was 78 adults (2024 – 63) and 5 children (2024– 8).

St Peters

As at April 2025 there were 34 parishioners (2024 – 42) on the St Peters' Electoral Roll.

Church membership, our worshipping community, those who regularly worship and are counted as part of the annual parish return, is 44 Adults (2024 - 42) and 8 Children (2024 - 5).

The average weekly attendance, taken during October 2025 was 41 adults (2024 - 43) and 3 Children (2024 – 1).

Also 26 adults and 22 Children attended Messy Church. (2024 15 Adults 22 Children)

Objectives and Activities

The trustees have paid due regard to the guidance given by the Charity Commission on public benefit when deciding what activities, the charity should undertake.

Our calling as God's people is to be a community who worship God through Jesus, who share the message of Jesus with the world, and who bless our parish in Jesus' name.

Each church does this in a slightly different way.

At St Peters we are called to 'Love God and love Westfield'. We seek to express this in 7 practices which find their roots in ancient Christian monasticism: Worship, Prayer, Hospitality, Availability, Community, Service and Study.

At St James we seek to be a Wholehearted Church, where we encounter God, grow as disciples, are equipped to live out the gospel, gather people in community. We sense a call to be a sanctuary, and to be a sending church.

In both churches, we seek to identify the particular calling and gifts of every individual, and release people into their God-given calling. We are blessed with many gifted church members, and many who give their time sacrificially and lovingly to God's service through our churches, and in the wider community.



Achievements and Performance

People and Staffing



Our clergy team continued to develop, with the ordination of Rev John Hanson as Deacon in June. John joins the team as a 'locally deployed minister', initially serving as curate. We recruited assistant Youth and Children and Families workers, so our staff team is now at full strength. Yeovil Town Council renewed their 3 year contract with us to deliver youth services on Westfield, which covers up to 2028.

It was another year in which several faithful members of our churches went to glory, in particular we give thanks for the life and service of Doug and Elaine Beard, Peter Peeke, Ruth Holloway, Kate Freer, Nicola Hedicker, and Diane Chown.

The church is the Body of Christ, and we cherish and celebrate the God-given gifts which all our members offer in service. Gifts in cake-making and care-giving, music and maintenance, finance and flute playing, artistry and administration, listening and leadership.

Worship:

- We are starting to welcome a few more families and children into our morning worship, and have had new members joining both churches.
- During the year we had sermon series on Lukes gospel, characters in the book of Acts, and Worship, as well as home group series on Bible meditation and memorization, and a season of prayer in Lent for more people to come to faith.
- St James music group strengthened considerably during the year after a recruitment drive.
- We have trialled a monthly 'Trio' format for sermons in both churches, to offer a conversational alternative to the usual format, and to give us the chance to hear a wider range of voices in reflecting on the Bible together.



- Both Sunday congregations remained about the same size as in 2024, though we have had new members joining both churches. Attendance at Messy Church has remained good, and St James at 4 and St Peters midweek service both draw a healthy congregation. St James midweek communion/prayers switched to Thursday, and remains a small gathering, though appreciated by those who come. .
- During the year we baptised 5 children and 1 adult, and conducted 17 funerals and 2 weddings.

Agusta Park

- 18 months in a tremendous amount has happened on the estate. The year began with the church adopting a large youth group, which had previously been run by local parents, and ended with an open-air Carol service attended by over 100 people.
- Lufton church has seen growth during the year, and hosted a Confirmation in the autumn for several of its members.
- A youth alpha course has developed out of the youth group, with a number of the young people joining an ongoing 'food and faith' group.
- Working with Kingfisher Primary School, Rev Sarah and Rev John are training up a group of children as 'pupil chaplains' within the school.
- The Pastoral Scheme to create a new expanded parish of Lufton with Thorne Coffin has now passed through all local consultation stages. We await word from the Church Commissioners about when it can be put into effect.



Church Life, Ministry and Witness

- The new Oasis Bereavement Café has developed into a well used and valued outreach to the community, led by our Lay Pastoral Assistants team. This has been supplemented by events throughout the year offering for bereaved families, such as a 'Longest Night' Christmas service and baby loss vigil in October.
- During Lent we had a focused time of prayer for more people to come to faith. It was a joy to discover some months later that several people who joined the church in the autumn speaking of God at work in their lives at the same time that we were praying.
- Our children and youth work continues to develop. During the year we took on new paid assistants in both areas, as well as taking on the running of the Agusta Park youth group. We're grateful to all staff and volunteers who serve in the youth groups, toddler groups, Messy Church and on Sundays. We have an increasing number of contacts with families and young people, and – particularly at St Peters – have seen more families starting to come on Sundays.
- We continue to support 4 Mission Partners (Open Doors, Compassion UK, Prison Fellowship and The Lords Larder) in prayer and with gifts of £1000 each during the year.
- We continue to be involved on a weekly basis at both local secondary schools, and have regular assembly and RE input to 3 local primary schools. Preston Primary has updated the school vision and values to something more overtly Christian: 'let your light shine' based on Matthew 5, including church input into staff training.
- We ran an Alpha course for enquirers, and our home groups continue to bless and serve around 90 church members. A new 'twilight' home group was launched for working people.
- In the summer Caryl Plewes and John Hanson were both ordained as Deacon and began their curacies, at Taunton Minster and in Preston Plucknett respectively.
- A large group from Westfield was taken to the Spree youth summer camp, many of them young people with no Christian background or church involvement, thanks to generous donations of church members.

St Peters Community Centre



The 'Warm Hub' launched in November 2022 continued to run throughout the year, offering drinks, welcome, company and food on a donation basis. The cost of food is largely covered by personal donations, the cost of running the kitchen and paying our cook is financed by outside grants. Along with the Community Pantry and Westfield Fresh (which gives away unsold supermarket food) we are supporting 100s of local people every week in food poverty.

The center continues to thrive under the leadership of Marie Rice, our manager, and the dedicated staff and volunteer team. During the year we received funding to launch an outreach 'Warm Hub' in the Birchfield neighborhood in Yeovil. Initially staffed by the Centre, the hope is to run this as a pilot and then hand over to local leadership and volunteers in 2026.

A key development in 2025 was the launch of opportunities for adult skills and learning. The Centre has run Slow Cooker and Air Fryer courses for several years, and it was always part of the vision to offer opportunities for leaning and skills to the local community. We ran courses in languages, art, and basic Maths and English skills in partnership with Somerset Skills and Learning, and are developing a rolling programme of classes for the community.



The year ended with the Bishop of Bath and Wells filming his Christmas message at the Centre, during which a number of interviews were filmed with Centre staff and volunteers. The Bishops video was accompanied by a pop-up community choir (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=U_J3lSLxCKg), and the interviews are at <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=EoctmDYXlho>

Fabric and Finance

St James Church had a number of significant repair jobs completed during the year, including the tower, boundary wall and church room roof. We are now up to date with all the urgent work identified in the Quinquennial survey.

Faculty approval was given for a project to replace the Bell frame in St James church tower, which is nearing the end of its usable life. The project will retune the bells and increase them from 6 to 8 – a full octave, as well as replacing the current frame. It is likely to cost £150,000+, but a good start has been made to fundraising, including a number of generous pledges.

Both churches ended the year with a small financial surplus. St James particularly benefited from a successful Gift Day, which raised over £11,000 for our ongoing costs. Our Parish Share paid to the Diocese continues to increase substantially, and the next few years will be challenging. As always! All of our costs are met by the generous giving of church members, plus fundraising activities and hire of premises. We continue to seek to grow the church and invest in mission, and to put the ‘fun’ into fundraising. There is no better investment than the Kingdom of God.

Thank you to everyone who supports the church financially, and through fundraising. We are incredibly grateful to Frances Croxford and Lynne Biles, our two fantastic Treasurers, who do such a superb job managing and communicating our finances throughout the year.

Deanery Synod Report

25th March 2025

- Richard Horner was welcomed to the meeting. He is now Rector for the Benefice of Ashington, Mudford, Marston Magna, Rimpton and Chilton Cantelo.
- Rev David Keen showed a slide show entitled “Talking Jesus” which asked how Christians had come to faith and how they find talking about their faith. Questions such as: how do people describe Jesus? Was he a historic person? Belief in the resurrection? Surveys show that 50% of the population know a practising Christian and that they are mostly seen in a positive light. However, many non-Christians describe the church quite negatively. It asks how easy it is to start a conversation with non-Christians and how confident are we to do so? It concluded that we should invite people to church! 24th June 2025

- Update on CAP: Christians Against Poverty. Mary Irwin who is the local Debt Centre Manager began her talk with an overview of Yeovil’s debt centre which opened in 2011 since which time they have been contacted by nearly 600 households, 170 of whom have gone debt free. Many of these people struggle with mental health with 1 in 3 feeling suicidal, though sadly this number is increasing to nearly 1 in 2. Martin Lewis, the well-known Money Saving Expert, recommends CAP to people in severe financial difficulty!
- Debt Centre Coaches do home visits with a befriender: these befrienders are a very important part of the organisation and come from seven different churches in the area. The gospel is shared and permission to pray with clients is always requested.
- In addition, a CAP Life Skills course started two years ago which teaches about food and cooking on a budget and other skills, and again, sharing the gospel is an important part of this. These courses have proved most successful with friendships being formed and lives transformed.
- Diocesan Lead Giving and Funding Adviser: Natalie Wainwright works at the Diocese supporting parishes with accessing grants, and maximising giving, etc. She began by talking about the Generous Church Check-up which has fourteen different questions for parishes to run through, like a health check for PCCs to carry out; she suggests this could be done at least once a year. Her advice includes how people might increase their donations and celebrating generosity, having an annual gift day, etc. She spoke about the Parish Giving Scheme which promotes giving by Direct Debit rather than by standing order and takes a lot of work away from treasurers. Gift Aid can be collected on a monthly basis this way, and an annual increase can be locked in in-line with inflation.

She recommended:

- An 8 week course called ‘Living Generously’ for home groups
- A booklet entitled “How to manage your Church Project Guide”.
- Regarding church projects, Mark Lister is the person to contact for advice: how to make best use of architects and local authorities.
- Visions for the church: getting permissions in place before applying for external grants
- How to finance projects and involving the wider community
- Grant funders: the national church has “Cornerstone” which is a grant funding database
- Card machines in churches have proved a positive way of collecting donations

14th October 2025

- David Keen introduced two new clergy who have recently begun work in the Deanery.

Rev Sarah Lloyd has begun work at St Michael's in Yeovil and is very new to the job having moved here from Guildford. She acknowledged that it is a big parish and that there is much to do. She has a dog which accompanies her during her ministry.

Rev John Hanson was ordained on 29th June this year. He was formerly in the Army, then the Prison Service, then worked for a legal firm before becoming a Reader in 2018 which led to his eventual ordination. He is now based in Preston Plunkett.

- Richard Priestley, New Christian Communities Development Lead was with us to talk on Mission and Mixed Ecology. He introduced himself as having, until six months ago, been the incumbent of a church on top of the Mendips where he had been for 12 years.

He began by asking us to discuss, in small groups, 'what is mission?'. There are five marks of mission needed to proclaim the gospel: tell, teach, tend, transform and treasure. And he stressed the importance of listening to people and their individual context.

Mixed ecology refers to diversity of worshipping communities, co-existing with mutual benefit and affirmation, when it may be necessary to think of 'doing church' another way, not just the traditional way: to include creative new things giving people the opportunity to come together to encounter God. He asked what is required to become a mixed ecology: hope and vision, values and humility. We are the body of Christ. He suggested that we, in our PCCs, could consider: What could be? And What will be?

Building and Fabric Reports

Fabric report for St James Church and Curtilage for 2025

The PCC have continued to ensure that the Church, Church Buildings and surrounds have been kept in good condition. All systems requiring annual safety and certification checks have been tested and rectified. This includes gas boilers, fire safety equipment, fire / security alarms and PAT testing. Additionally, a fire risk assessment was carried out for the Church and associated buildings, this to be repeated every 3 years. The Asbestos Register was also updated. This was initiated due to the discovery of asbestos containing material in external cement boards on the narthex exterior.

Small works, repairs and projects.

Faculty was applied for and granted for the following Quinquennial related work to be carried out through 2025.

Emergency Repairs to the Church tower

Boundary wall repairs

Church room roof investigation

Church room roof repairs

Office ventilation

Tree pruning of a large conifer, removal of dead branches.

Inspection of headstones for stability. A total of 13 headstones were identified as need of attention.

None were in immediate danger of toppling over. These will be attended to in Spring 2026.

The main (Church) audio amplifier failed. Repairs proved to be impractical, and a new unit was purchased and installed.

Major Works and Projects.

Rehang and Augmentation of Church Bells

A Faculty application was applied for and granted for this work to commence. This work is required due to the deterioration of the current bell frame and fittings. The target end date for project completion is 2029. A working committee has been set up to move this project forward. This will now allow detailed surveys to be carried out resulting in a detailed scope of works. This in turn will be used to obtain quotations and project costings. Project fund raising is in its infancy as is the listing of possible organisations for financial support and grant applications.

Fabric report for St Peters Church, Community Centre and Curtilage

St Peters Church PCC and the Community Centre Committee have continued to ensure that the Church, Community Centre and surrounds have been kept in good condition. All systems requiring annual safety and certification checks have been tested and rectified. This includes gas boilers, fire safety equipment, fire / security alarms and PAT testing. A quinquennial survey of St Peter's Church and Community centre was carried out and a comprehensive report generated.

No major issues arose and the buildings and curtilage were found in good condition with no major defects. Minor recommended repairs to be raised at the next church committee meeting. It is expected that such small works and repairs will be worked upon throughout 2026 and reported on in 2027.

Small works, repairs and projects.

A small area of roof (to the north west elevation) had missing roof tiles resulting in the ingress of rain into the church to the left of the altar. These tiles were replaced and the roof made weatherproof. Internal damage and water staining to the Church internal ceiling was made good.

Two LED display monitors were procured and wall mounted inside the community centre café area. A white board display was procured and wall mounted in the meeting room. A new fridge and freezer unit were procured for the kitchen as were new fridges / chiller cabinets for the small meeting room.

As requested by the church committee a pair of large wrought iron gates that were in storage (in the bin store) and had been for a while were disposed of via a scrap merchant.

Major Works and Projects.

A comprehensive package of roof mount solar panels was installed on the community centre south facing pitched hipped roofs. The solar panels form part of a system comprising of a battery pack and control equipment installed in the bin store. This project has been very successful meaning that weather permitting the Community Centre and Church are near self-sufficient in electricity usage.

The whole west facing church roof has been replaced with new. This included new British Standard regulation breathable membrane and treated wooden battens as well as roofing tiles. The work was finished off with a dry ridge system.

2. Independent Examiners Report to the Trustees of the Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of Preston Plucknett

I report on my examination of the accounts of the above charity (“the Trust”) for the year ended 31st December 2024 set out on pages 15 to 28.

Responsibilities and basis of report

As the charity’s trustees you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 (“the Act”).

I report in respect of my examination of the Trust’s accounts carried out under Section 145 of the 2011 Act and in carrying out my examination, I have followed all the applicable Directions given by the Charity Commission under Section 145 (5)(b) of the Act.

Independent Examiner’s Statement

I have completed my examination; I confirm that no material matters have come to my attention in connection with the examination which gives me cause to believe in any material respect:

- the accounting records were not kept in accordance with section 130 of the Charities Act, or
- the accounts did not accord with the accounting records; or
- the accounts did not comply with the applicable requirements concerning the form and content of accounts set out in the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 other than any requirement that the accounts give a ‘true and fair’ view which is not a matter considered as part of an independent examination.

I have no concerns and have come across no other matters in connection with the examination to which attention should be drawn in this report in order to enable a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached.

3.Financial Review and Reserves Policy

Parish Financial Review

Overall, 2025 has been a good year for Parish. We managed again to pay our Parish Share in full, £93,708, and we even ended the year with a small underspend on both our churches General Unrestricted funds - St James £4,584 and St Peters £1,504.

Income

Total receipts on unrestricted and designated funds were £169,342 (2024 - £144,092) and for restricted funds £164,591 (2024 - £139,852) giving a total income of £333,833 (2024 - £313,944).

The restricted fund receipts include £132,516 to St Peters Community Centre, £19,542 to the Parish Youth Fund, £8,305 to Parish Family and Children's Worker Fund and £4,225 to Bell Project.

Expenditure

Expenditure on unrestricted and designated funds amounted to £162,165 (2024 - £140,862) and restricted funds £169,374 (2024 - £154,517) giving a total expenditure of £331,539 (2024 - £295,379).

Restricted Fund Expenditure includes £134,614 for St Peters Community Centre, £18,354 to the Parish Youth Fund and £16,406 to Parish Family and Children's Worker Fund.

Note: Designated funds are those funds that the PCC has decided to allocate monies to. Restricted funds are those funds for which monies have been specifically given and are therefore restricted as to what they can be used for.

Reserves policy

It is PCC policy to try to maintain a balance on free unrestricted reserves which equates to at least three months unrestricted payments. This is equivalent to £34,238 (St James £26,463 St Peters £7,775). It is held to smooth out fluctuations in cash flow and to meet emergencies. The balance of the free reserves at the yearend was £48,006 (St James £31,092 St Peters £16,914). This is within the 3 months minimum.

It was agreed by the PCC that if St James Free Reserves fell below 3-month general running costs that there would need to be a delay in paying of St James parish Share.

Funds

A summary of funds can be found under note 6.

It is our policy to invest our funds balances with the CBF Church of England Deposit Fund. Balance as at 31 December 2025 £76,298 (St James £46,042, St Peters £30,256)

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 31st December 2024

1. General Information

The PCC is a charity registered with the Charity Commission in England & Wales, number 1158827, and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is The Parish Office, St James' Church, Preston Plucknett, Preston Road, Yeovil, Somerset, BA20 2EZ.

2. Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and on an accrual's basis in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 and Charities Act 2011, together with applicable accounting standards, FRS 102 and the Charities SORP (FRS 102).

3. Accounting Policies

Basis of preparation

The Financial Statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the Financial Statements of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body. The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Funds

See separate notes 6, 16 and 17.

Income

Collections are recognised when receivable by or on behalf of the PCC.

The income from social events etc. is accounted for gross of expenses at the time it is received.

Rental income from the letting of church premises is recognised when the event takes place, and the revenue is earned. Any amounts not received at the year-end are shown within accounts receivable.

Interest is accounted for when receivable.

All legacies receivable are credited to the statement of financial activities as incoming resources.

Donations under gift aid are recognised as income when the donation is received. Donations of items other than cash are included in income at current value.

Income tax recoverable under the gift aid scheme is recognised at the same time as the donation to which they relate.

Expenditure

Resources expended are shown gross, including irrecoverable VAT, and are accounted for on an accrual's basis. Costs are allocated directly to the category to which they relate or apportioned on an equitable basis where they involve more than one category. Where this allocation is not possible costs are allocated within "other costs". Missionary and Charitable giving is accounted for when awarded and paid out at the beginning of the next financial Year.

Fixed Assets

Consecrated and beneficed property is excluded from Financial Statements by s10(2) of the Charities Act 2011. No value is placed on movable church furnishings held by the churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal, since the PCC considers this to be inalienable property. All expenditure incurred during the year on consecrated or beneficed buildings and moveable church furnishings, whether maintenance or improvements, is written off as expenditure in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) and separately disclosed in the notes to the Financial Statements. The value of the church hall is not included in the Statement of Financial Position as it forms part of a single building with St Peter's Church. All expenditure incurred in the year on maintenance or improvement of the property is written off as expenditure in the SOFA and separately disclosed in the notes to the Financial Statements. Other fixed assets over £5,000 are capitalised at cost and depreciated over 4 years on a straight-line basis.

Current Assets

Amounts owing to the PCC at the balance sheet date are shown as debtors.

Short term deposits include cash held on deposit with CBF Church of England Funds.

Current Liabilities

Creditors are provided in the accounts when expenditure is incurred in the accounting year but not paid until later accounting periods.

Grants

Grants are accounted for on the basis of date of receipt.

Value Added Tax

The charity is not registered for VAT. VAT on certain repairs to the church building can be reclaimed under the Listed Places of Worship Scheme.

Judgements and key sources of uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

18. St Peters Community Centre Finance Report – Jan – Dec 2025

This note is just for reference.

All of the funds for St Peters Community Centre are held within St Peters Restricted fund (see Note 17 above and note 6). The Centre management committee felt it useful to divide the total funds between the funds stated below, but they are all Parish Restricted funds to be used for the running of the Community Centre.
